Note: A free bus shuttle service will be provided to those without a mode of transport. The bus will leave Larkin City near the front entrance to Colleen Larkin Memorial Park at 10:30am, and will return to the same spot from Banshee Point, leaving at 4:00 p.m.



The annual Fair Days were initiated in 1892 by our city's founder, John Larkin. The events had been much different in those days. There was no memorial park in the village, as it was then, but the people organized games for children as well as selling their wares, and large feasts took place all around the city.

It was not until 1907 that Roderick Larkin allowed the public onto a small stretch of the beach below Banshee Point so they could enjoy the ocean and hunt for clams. Later, Roderick's son, Patrick, permitted the entire town to converge on the beach for one day at the end of the fair, drinking, eating, and playing games. Ever since then, and during the current life of Patrick's sons, Brian and Rory, the tradition continued.

Population increases over the years necessitated a ticket system for the beach party on the Larkin estate. From tax rolls, 1,500 names are selected at random every year and formal invitations are sent.
